Go Bully auction features Sprankle works, visit from 'Teddy Roosevelt'

In the wake of Hurricane Ian, "Ding" Darling Wildlife Society-Friends of the Refuge (DDWS) has evolved its annual Go Wild for "Ding" annual fundraiser to Go Bully for "Ding" – An Evening with Teddy Roosevelt, riffing off one of the popular president's favorite expressions. The sold-out event takes place on March 6.

Although tickets are no longer available, anyone can bid on unique live auction items while helping the J.N. "Ding" Darling National Wildlife Refuge recover from severe hurricane damage to facilities and wildlife habitat.

Headlining the auction prizes, a Mangrove Cuckoo sculpture in a display case, carved by renowned bird carver Jim Sprankle, is as rare as the bird it depicts. Much sought-after by birding lifelisters, the mangrove cuckoo is elusive but iconic of "Ding" Darling. Sprankle no longer creates his full-size bird sculptures, which have been valued at up to \$60,000.

"The lucky bidder who takes home the Sprankle Mangrove Cuckoo not only gets to spot the secretive bird every day, but will possess a keepsake highly prized by collectors," said Ann-Marie Wildman, DDWS associate executive director.

Sprankle has also carved one of his famous Feather Club jewelry pieces, enhanced by Congress Jewelers with 14-carat gold and diamond accents. The successful bidder on the Mangrove Cuckoo Feather also becomes a member of the prestigious Sprankle Feather Club, which flocks together every year for a special event starring the sculptor himself.

Other prizes on the auction block include a Teddy Roosevelt Experience and a piece of art from the Refuge Welcome Archway.



Reprisor Joe Wiegand has been bringing President Roosevelt to life for more than a decade and has performed in all 50 states and overseas, including a White House performance in honor of Roosevelt's 150th birthday in 2008. He has made numerous appearances at "Ding" Darling, one of his favorite venues, and he will make a day's appearance at your choice of locales, whether it be your grandchild's school or a private gathering at your home.

The original 3D artwork created by North Carolina artist David Williams for the archway on the entrance ramp to the Visitor & Education Center got broken into pieces by Ian. One segment, realistically depicting a raccoon tucked into mangrove leaves, has been rescued to put on the auction block as a one-of-a-kind piece of wildlife art for indoors or out.
